Blackbrook Audubon Society



Get to know common residents

Becoming familiar with the area's most common birds is not only good for honing your birding abilities, but it makes observing something less common stand out even more! Below are some common birds you may encounter all year long!



Black-capped chickadee
This tiny bird is common at feeders in

This tiny bird is common at feeders in winter months. Look for a round grayish bird with a black cap and white cheeks.



Blue jay

This large crested blue, black and gray bird is found in just about any habitat. It is loud and often mimics other birds like hawks.



House finch

A common feeder bird all year, house finches are a muted mottled brown. Males sport a red face and throat.



Tufted titmouse

A small gray bird with a pointed crest, this feisty little bird is related to a chickadee and found in the same habitat.



Red-bellied woodpecker

The red belly of this medium-sized woodpecker is difficult to see. Look for a bird that's tan, black and white with red on top of its head



American goldfinch

Bright yellow in summer and drab in winter, the American goldfinch can reliably be identified by its black wing with light wingbars.



White-breasted nuthatch

This small gray and white bird visits feeders and is distinct in its behavior of walking down tree trunks.



Northern cardinal

Common year-round residents, males are all red with a crest and black mask, while females are brown with red highlights.



American robin

A stocky bird with a gray back and rusty breast. Robins often forage on the ground and are year-round residents.
